His All Holiness, Bartholomew I, Archbishop of Constantinople, New Rome and Ecumenical Patriarch, Turkey

Spiritual leader of approximately 300 million Orthodox Christians world-wide. A citizen of Turkey, Patriarch Bartholomew's personal experience provides him a unique perspective on the continuing dialogue among the Christian, Islamic and Jewish worlds.

He works to advance reconciliation among Catholic, Muslim and Orthodox communities, such as in former Yugoslavia. His efforts to promote human rights and religious tolerance, together with his pioneering work for international peace and environmental protection, have placed him at the forefront of global visionaries as an apostle of love, peace and reconciliation. In 1997, he was awarded the Gold Medal of the United States Congress.

Dr. Arthur Lyon Dahl, Switzerland

Coordinator of the UNEP/University of Geneva Environmental Diplomacy Programme and President of the International Environment Forum. Retired Deputy Assistant Executive Director of UNEP. He represented the Baha'i International Community at the Stockholm Conference on the Human Environment (1972), was in the Secretariat of the Rio Earth Summit (1992), and participated in the World Summit on Religions and Conservation (Windsor, 1995) and the World Parliament of Religions (Barcelona, 2004). Member of the governing board of the European Baha'i Business Forum. His books include "Unless and Until: A Baha'i Focus on the Environment" and "The Eco Principle: Ecology and Economics in Symbiosis".



Ms. Liza Higgins-Zogib, Switzerland

Manager, People and Conservation at WWF International and leader of the "poverty and conservation" initiative. She is strengthening WWF's work and position on indigenous peoples' issues. Liza is particularly interested in the role of the sacred/spirit in the conservation of biodiversity and she co-authored the WWF/ARC publication "Beyond

Belief: linking faiths and protected areas to support biodiversity conservation". Her expertise also includes protected area management issues. Aside her official duties with WWF Liza is studying for a doctoral degree in Yoga Philosophy and Meditation with the International Vedic Hindu University, and is a practitioner and teacher of Raja Yoga.

Mr. Fazlun M. Khalid, United Kingdom

Founding director of the Islamic Foundation for Ecology and Environmental Sciences (IFEES), former Director of Training for the Alliance of Religions and Conservation (ARC). Bearing witness in his work to the interconnection of racism, poverty, debt, and environmental degradation, Khalid recognized the necessity for Muslims to contribute to contemporary environmental thinking and efforts to confront the global environmental crisis. IFEES was founded in the mid 1980s in order to articulate these aspirations and convictions.



Dr. Claude Martin, Switzerland

Chancellor of the International University in Geneva, former Director General of WWF International (1993-2005). board member of Precious Woods, the International Institute for Sustainable Development (IISD), several WWF National Organisations, and various other environmental organizations. Honorary Advisor of WWF International, chairman of

the International Sustainability Innovation Council of Switzerland – ISIS, and the chairman of the Roundtable on Sustainable Biofuels (RSB) – both initiatives of the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology (ETH/EPF). He was awarded the "Commander of the Golden Arc" by the late Prince Bernhard of the Netherlands and is a Fellow of the World Academy of Art and Science.

Dr. Peter Pavlovic, Belgium

Study Secretary of the Church and Society Commission of the Conference of European Churches (CEC) in Brussels, a fellowship of some 120 Orthodox, Protestant, Anglican and Old Catholic Churches from all countries of Europe, Secretary of the European Christian Environmental Network. He holds a university degree in physics and theology and is an ordained minister of the Lutheran church. In his current position he works on promoting the dialogue among the churches in Europe and dialogue of the churches with the European political institutions such as the European Union and Council of Europe. The focus of his work is the relation between churches, religions and politics as well as protection of the environment and globalisation.



Prof. Dr. Bron Taylor, USA

President of the International Society for the Study of Religion, Nature and Culture and editor of the Journal for the Study of Religion, Nature and Culture. As Samuel S. Hill Ethics Professor at the University of Florida, he has taught in the world's first graduate program focusing on Religion and Nature. He has written widely about environment

tal movements and environmentalism globally. His publications include the multi-volume and award winning "Encyclopedia of Religion and Nature", "Ecological Resistance Movements: The Global Emergence of Radical and Popular Environmentalism" and "Affirmative Action at Work". His next book, "Dark Green Religion", will appear soon. He is the host of www.religionandnature.com, which is a qateway to the above-mentioned initiatives, research, and teaching.

*****THE ROLE OF RELIGION IN ENVIRONMENTAL GOVERNANCE***

While environmental governance has received widespread attention in recent years, the role of religion in this context is yet to be explored - from its influence on individual actors to shaping cultural frameworks.

On the one hand, religion can provide guidance towards sustainable actions. The discursive role of religions can influence societal beliefs, values and norms that consequently can change individual behaviours. On the other hand, the role of religion and religious stakeholders in collective actions can be of crucial importance. Religious institutions in participatory processes can provide the public sphere with tools to grasp moral dimensions of environmental concerns. Finally, in collaborative policy making processes religious affiliation can be an obstacle or a catalyst for achieving agreements.

The aim of the 2008 Freiburg Forum on Environmental Governance is to initiate a resilient dialogue across boundaries, disciplines and sectors encouraging innovative perspectives and novel approaches.

A forum reader featuring students' background papers is available to participants. It is intended to deepen the understanding of and facilitate access to the 2008 Forum topic.
